## The Chiefs' Prophecy: Survival of the Northern Cheyenne Nation

### **Film Synopsis**

Filmed on the Northern Cheyenne Indian Reservation in southeastern Montana, The Chiefs Prophecy chronicles the history of the Northern Cheyenne leadership. From the creation of the first warrior societies and the elaborate Council of Forty Four Chief system, through brutal wars with the United States Army and the Reservation era, the Northern Chevenne people have survived. The modern challenges of colonization, loss of culture, and loss of spirituality have taken toll on the new generation of leaders. The Cheyenne philosophy of peace can be used to rebuild the broken spirits of the Northern Chevenne people. What does the future hold?

#### **Director's Biography**

Leo Killsback is a member of the Northern Cheyenne Nation of Southeastern Montana. Killsback is from Busby, Montana and culturally and spiritually identifies as a Cheyenne person. Leo is currently completing requirements for a doctoral degree at graduate school at the University of Arizona American Indian Studies Program. His

dissertation is on the history of Cheyenne leadership beginning with the ancient time, through colonization, warfare, the reservation era, and ending with the modern era. While writing his dissertation entitled, *The Chiefs' Prophecy: the Destruction of Original Northern Cheyenne Leadership During the Critical Era, 1876-1935*, Killsback had the opportunity to film, edit, and produce a documentary film in collaboration with Arizona Public Media. Killsback produced *The Chiefs' Prophecy: Survival of the Northern Cheyenne Nation* (2009), which is based on his upcoming dissertation.



## Special Presentation: Thursday 6:00 - 7:30 pm -- Nevada 3

**389 Miles: "Living the Border"** is a human journey, a story documented by director Luis Carlos Davis who grew up in the shadow of the Mexico-Arizona border. It presents the raw, daily life of human beings compromised economically, and the potential rewards for those who exploit them. There is no purely good side or bad, only the steel wall or a strand of rusty barbed wire and the complex web of human emotions and issues forged by them—survival, human trafficking, rape, corruption, evil and grace in many disguises.

The journey starts at Mile 1 in Douglas, Arizona where a Border Patrol agent apprehends two undocumented migrants, one from Mexico and the other from Costa Rica who spots a woman walking near by and spontaneously and sarcastically gives notice to the agent of her presence and suggests to him that he "get her". It continues westward to reveal the soft underbelly of border towns on both sides, exploring remote locations known only by Polleros or smugglers who can make between \$200,000 to \$500,000 a year.

The use of an unobtrusive camera allows the characters to speak simply, honestly and with dignity, no matter what their position on immigration might be. Together they form a complex human mosaic which goes beyond the current



debate about immigration to explore the human relations forged by the border, from a sense of a common neighborhood across the fence, to border residents, to vigilante police patrolling along the border in an attempt to



seal it, to activists on both sides of the border who are trying to help the undocumented migrants on their harsh, treacherous and unpredictable journey. Sometimes the border is barely visible, only a barbed wire fence. Sometimes it is a formidable steel wall.

Throughout the film it is a constant visual character that connects or separates all those who "live" the border. The 389




mile journey ends in San Luis, Sonora, Mexico at a migrant camp in a remote desert location where people weigh the risks and opportunities as they embark on a dangerous journey filled with uncertainty.


## Special Showing: Saturday 4:30 – 6 pm -- Nevada 5

**Canoe Way: The Sacred Journey** documents the annual Tribal Journeys of Pacific Northwest Coast Salish people. Indigenous tribes and First Nations from Oregon,



Washington, Canada and Alaska follow their ancestral pathways through the waters of Puget Sound, Inside Passage and the Northwest Coast. Families and youth reconnect with the past and each other. Ancient songs, dances, regalia, ceremonies, and language were almost lost and are coming back. Witness first hand, through the words and images of a proud people, as they share the story of the resurgence of the cedar canoe societies – and how it has opened a spiritual path of healing through tradition.

"I had the great fortune of seeing this beautiful film about the annual Tribal Journeys of the Pacific Northwest Coast Salish people. Not only do the people of the Northwest participate, but people from other areas (as of late – examples being Australia, Japan and New Zealand) make the trek to Neah Bay, to race in canoes. This film features interviews with participants, ceremonies and beautiful footage of the actual canoe race. We hear stories and passages from people of every walk of life, as well as from different Tribal affiliations. This film succeeds in capturing the collective atmosphere of this beautiful event. Every summer, people come together over the



canoe race. They also come closer to knowing their own true nature, through the process of training for the journey. Please watch this film. It is truly beautiful."






